Why the Mission & Ministry Moment?

13th in a series of "why" questions about what we do as a church, particularly during worship Worship is not a spectator sport; it's a full participation experience. Worship isn't a show put on by the professionals; it's an experience hosted by leaders who empower all who've gathered to have a part. If worship were just for watching and consuming, the congregation would



stay seated and mostly be silent. Because it's for participating, we have times for all people to stand, to sing, to pray, and to speak.

The preacher is not the only one in the congregation with something personal to say. Every one of us has a story to share – a faith story, a God moment, a spiritual insight, a holy encounter. Yes, you, reading this sentence, have a testimony to share about God in your life! You and I have opportunities nearly every day to speak of faith and share of God's goodness. Oftentimes these opportunities come along with just one other person present. Or maybe it comes over a meal, or with a small group of people. Once in a while, you may speak to a room of people of diverse ages and backgrounds. This is what our congregation has come to call the Mission & Ministry Moment.

Beginning ten years ago, our congregation made room in our worship service to hear the voices of God's people speaking from the heart. We had just finished our first experience with *Unbinding Your Heart*, a book and congregational journey of prayer and faith sharing. This is the same 6-week journey we took again this past April and May. Once again, God used this journey to teach us what a treasure our faith is, that we all have stories of God and God's church to share, and that other people love to hear these stories. Sharing our stories strengthens our faith, spreads faith, and gives others courage to find their own stories to share.

I know of no other congregation that calls a time in worship the "Mission & Ministry Moment." Some congregations may call it a "temple talk" or a "testimony time." I've given workshops to church leaders about our "Mission & Ministry Moment" (shorthand MMM...because it's "Mmm Mmm good"), and others have been hopeful to try it. We crafted the

name because it's a time to hear about the mission of God – how God is moving in our lives, and about the ministry of God's church – how God is working through our ministries to make a difference.

In our worship service, the MMM comes after we've sung our gathering song. It's the first thing we do in the "Word" movement of worship, right before the scripture reading. When we first started this in 2013, people were very hesitant. My invitations to speak were often declined. After all, it's not easy to speak in front of a crowd. For many people it is a genuine phobia, undergirded by a fear of judgment and negative evaluation. But over the years, the MMM has caught on beyond our expectations. People have realized that you don't have to be an expert in Bible or theology to have something to share; you just give it some thought and share what you know. We've also learned that our congregation receives these messages with grace and gratitude.

We have a Mission and Ministry Moment at almost every worship service, usually the same on Saturday and Sunday. Rarely do we miss. Sometimes people will step forward and offer to share an insight, story, or experience. Other times I invite someone to share based on what I know they might have within them to say. We give everyone a guideline of 3-5 minutes, and we clarify that the Mission and Ministry Moment is less about information and more about inspiration. We don't want to just hear about a past or future event; tell us why it matters to you. People have shared about impactful church ministries, top ten lists of things for which they are grateful, about people who cultivated their faith, how an experience brought them closer to God, and more. During the MMM we also receive new members, enjoy music or dance, offer special blessings, and celebrate milestones. Over ten years, it's become one of our favorite

moments in worship, and I hope it's here to stay.

God is active in our world, in our church, and in your life. What story of faith do you have to share?

BACCALAUREATE SERVICE FOR HIGH SCHOOL & COLLEGE GRADUATES



ANCHORS OF FAITH


A series for adults to explore the foundations of Christianity



REACHING OUT: SERVICE & INVITATION

MISSION PARTNER: STUDYING AT WARTBURG SEMINARY

This has been a difficult semester. I've had to confront a lot of the harmful things that I experienced in Christian communities in the past. I didn't realize how much I had been carrying with me until going through some of my coursework. More than ever, I have relied heavily on the support I've gotten from St. John's. My Hebrew Bible project for the semester was on



Jonah 3. I found myself focused on the Israelite people who would have been reading the text while in exile, holding out hope that God had a plan for them even though they were struggling.

This semester I learned that every sermon I preach should be a proclamation of the good news of the gospel, no matter what. I learned that in the midst of a hopeless situation in Nazi Germany, Dietrich Bonhoeffer still held onto hope that the church could triumph over evil, and never completely stopped believing in the goodness of (at least some of) his fellow humans. I reflected about the protective factors that LGBTQ+ young people have in our town and in our church community, and learned some of the ways that we can continue to grow in building trust and support.

COUNCIL MATTERS

Positive forward momentum was the theme of our most recent Church Council meeting. We continue to hear from new and long-term members about a strong spirit of welcome and vitality in our congregation. Council discussed plans to organize a congregation-wide prayer network to lift up every household. A draft of a comprehensive personnel manual is ready for additional readers and revisions. Council voted to pursue St. John's hosting our own three-year-old preschool in the south basement, pending a qualified teacher. This would pick up the baton from Pathway Preschool, our wonderful tenant for the last 10 years, when it closes at the end of this school year (Pathway also offered 4K, which the school district has brought into its own facility and staffing). Council named building projects to be prioritized by the Building & Grounds Committee, including a new roof, the possibility of solar panels, the use of the south basement (where Pathway 4K was located), and an assessment of previous building plans prior to the onset of the pandemic. A total of \$15,000 has been designated and approved for college students for next year from the three scholarship funds of St. John's. Council approved the purchase of new Bibles from Memorial Funds designated for education. Pastor Matt presented 17 confirmation students for full membership.

FAITHFUL SERVICE HIGHLIGHT: ST. MARK'S FREE FRIDAY COMMUNITY MEAL

Jesus said, "For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me." - Matthew 25:35

Once a month, servant workers from St. John's and I head into Madison and feed Jesus. We arrive at St. Mark's Lutheran Church on Madison's south side at 10:30am, ready to work



where we are needed to get the Free Friday Community Meal ready to be



served at noon. Often our tasks are to clean and cut vegetables for a lettuce salad, to clean and cut fruit for a fruit salad, to wash dishes, and to set the tables. Every Friday people gather at St. Mark's for this free community meal. Sometimes people come to the Friday meal for economic reasons, sometimes they

come to be part of a community, and sometimes they come for both. Whatever the reason, they come! The hot meal is delicious, filling, and nutritious. Volunteers have a chance, too, to enjoy the meal and sit with others who have come for lunch. We clean up the leftovers, sending as much as we can with the people who came, do dishes, and wash the tables. Along the way, we are fed – physically and spiritually.

CHARITY HIGHLIGHT: LUTHERAN BIBLE TRANSLATORS Fewer than 550 of the more than 7000 languages in the world have translations of the complete Bible. About 180 million people today do not have any Scripture available in their language. Most of these people belong to minority languages, and many struggle to maintain their identity in the shadow of majority culture. Often they have no written language of their



own. Lutheran Bible Translators (LBT) is working to change this. As an independent Lutheran organization, their mission is to make God's Word accessible to those who do not yet have it in the language of their hearts. God is transforming the lives of people around the world as they read and use God's Word in their heart language.

Since 2018, St. John's has supported Rev. Carl and Kelsey Grulke and family in their mission work with LBT. They have been in Botswana, Africa, to help in translation projects for people who do not have God's written word in their own language. Like all LBT missionaries, the Grulkes team up with local partners to navigate the intricacies and challenges of translation. Their mission inspired us to partner with them to help share God's word with more of God's people. Our 2023 daily ministry budget includes a commitment of \$1000 for the Grulke's mission in Botswana.

STEWARDSHIP WORD OF THE MONTH



Private or Personal – Money is one of those topics that people tend to avoid in social conversations. Our culture has made finances to be a very *private* matter. You have to know someone pretty well to ask them how much they paid for their house, the amount of their annual salary, or their total liquid assets. Is it a good thing that we treat our finances so privately? What if we dropped our defenses about money? What if we truly believed that money is a gift

from God and that it's our job to manage it? Instead of holding our money so privately to our hearts, we could learn a lot from each other through honest talk about money; we could better encourage each other to use our money well. Our finances don't have to be private. Yes, they will probably always be a very *personal* matter. But our personal finances also impact many other people. When we pool our personal finances together in generosity, we can do something more, something greater as a community. In this way, our *personal* finances become beautifully *communal* and even holy.

pride. **Donate any or all items, and a team will assemble them.** Each Baby Care Kit includes the following, size 6-24 months:

- **Two** lightweight cotton t-shirts (no onesies)
- Two long- or short-sleeved gowns or sleepers (without feet)
- Two receiving blankets, medium-weight cotton or flannel, or crocheted or knitted with lightweight yard, between 36"-52" square
- Four cloth diapers, flat fold preferred
- **One** jacket, sweater, or sweatshirt with hood, *or include a baby cap*
- Two pairs of socks
- One hand towel (dark color recommended)
- **Two** bath-size bars (4-5 oz each) of gentle soap, in original wrapper; no mini or hotel size bars
- Two diaper pins or large safety pins
