Why Worship Leaders?

17th in a series of "why" questions about what we do as a church, particularly during worship



Forty people. That's how many people we recruit and schedule every weekend to assist in leading worship. These 40 people all contribute to

our vibrant worship life, either on Saturday or on Sunday. They are greeters and ushers, prayer leaders and communion servers, musicians and audio/visual technicians, readers and more. Some are up front. Some are behind the scenes. All of them matter, in more ways than one. Yes, it matters that they do their job. But they also send an important message.

I remember serving as an acolyte when I was in middle school. I loved it! I wore the robe and cincture; I liked the reverence and responsibility. My most memorable time serving was in the 7th grade when I extinguished the candles one by one during the Good Friday Service of Darkness. In 8th grade I was invited to pound the nail after each reading for Good Friday. These times made an impression on me. They taught me that I have gifts to contribute to the church — what an important lesson for us all.

When I was in high school, I can't tell you how many times I played my saxophone during worship. Our organist was also a songwriter, and she wrote pieces for alto sax and piano. She invited me to play often. I also sang solos and duets with my sister. I was excited to go to worship on those days I was providing music, because I knew I had something to offer. Then, somewhere along the line, I also realized that I had something to offer from the pew, too – my voice for the hymns, yes, but also my faith, my attention, and my sheer presence.

In college I assisted in leading worship on campus in a variety of ways. I probably did just about every leadership role there is, eventually preaching as well. I gained confidence in myself to be in front of people and to serve the church. I grew in faith and in my sense of community. God used these leadership opportunities to grow my sense of vocation.

Leading in worship is a great way to empower people of all ages, children included. I love it when our elementary children lead worship with me.

What a great experience for them and for us! Maybe it will start a habit of worship and service for a lifetime. Hopefully they will learn as I did that they have gifts to offer, and that we want them and God wants them.

Forty people is a lot of worship leaders. Could we probably get by with fewer? Probably. But we would miss out on the gifts they bring. All these leaders add to the vitality and hospitality of our worship life. By offering their gifts, our 40 worship leaders communicate much more than any words or actions could. Their leadership says that we all have gifts to share, that our gifts matter. **That worship is not a spectator sport but rather a full-participation event.** That we value participation over polished performance. That you don't have to be a clergy person to serve the church or to serve God. That the church wants and welcomes you and what gifts you have to offer.

It is not just the pastor's or church worker's job to lead worship and serve God. One of Martin Luther's (1483-1546) key contributions to the Reformation is his emphasis on the "priesthood of all believers." Unlike the medieval church, which taught that priests were above all others and only priests had a calling from God, Martin Luther taught that we all have a calling to serve God. You have gifts for God to use in the church and in the world. Every Christian has a calling from God to do God's work. Every Christian is capable and called to lead in worship.

It is very easy to approach worship with a consumer mentality. We are so used to being consumers and getting what we want. It's easy to come for worship for what we can "get" out of it. I've done the same thing; I've left worship at various churches and said, "Well, I didn't get anything out of that!" But what a limited approach that is to worship. Yes, I hope we all get something out of worship... that we get inspiration, hope, love, and strength for the days ahead. But worship is not just about what we get out of it; it's also what we put into it. And when we put ourselves into our worship, whether as a worship leader or from the pew, we'll likely get more out of it.



REACHING UP: WORSHIP & PRAYER

Icons of Faith: A 5-Week Sermon Series

Icon: a religious painting of a holy figure. This is one definition of "icon" that we'll consider over five weeks. Icons are packed full of symbols, most notably halos, letters, and colors. These traditional works of art date back to the very early days of Christianity, and they are still made today. Icons are typically painted on wood panels and are especially important in Eastern Orthodox and Catholic traditions.



Over the centuries, the church has at times opposed these images for being misused as idolatrous or graven images. But their use was reinstated for veneration and devotion. Lutherans teach respect for icons as inspiration for faithful living from saintly role models. As we look at icons in worship, we'll consider iconic people, both Biblical and modern, who are widely admired for having significant influence in a particular sphere, and how they inspire our faith.

The Saints of God, on Earth and in Heaven

All Saints Day – November 1 – originally honored those who were considered especially holy: heroic figures from the Scriptures and martyrs who had given their lives nonviolently in witness to the faith. However, it is an especially Lutheran emphasis to honor all who have been baptized into Christ's death. All Saints Day resonates with the conviction that, in Christ, every saint is a sinner and every sinner a saint: *simul justus et peccator* (Latin). Lutherans especially remember that it is God's grace, apart from our works, that makes us saints. We find lasting rest only in the mercy of God.



We are united with the full community of sinners and saints, the living and the dead, in heaven and on earth. On All Saints Day, we celebrate our sainthood as forgiven sinners by God's grace. We pause to honor those who became saints through baptism, and to remember the saints who have gone before us to dwell in heaven with God.

In worship on November 4 and 5, we will name all of those who have received the gift of baptism at St. John's since last November. May God continue to bless these new members of the body of Christ:

Each symbol represents a story from within this family tree and a step toward the birth of Jesus.

Veterans Reflect on Service and Faith

In 1921, an unknown World War I American soldier was buried in Arlington National Cemetery. The ceremony took place on November 11, giving universal recognition to the celebrated ending of WWI fighting at 11 a.m., November 11, 1918 (the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month). The day became known as "Armistice Day." After World War II, Armistice Day changed to honor all veterans. The first celebration using the term Veterans Day occurred in Birmingham, Alabama on November 11, 1947. Later, U.S. Representative Edward Rees of Kansas proposed a bill that would change Armistice Day to Veterans Day. In 1954, Congress passed the bill that President Eisenhower signed proclaiming November 11 as Veterans Day. Read the reflections of several of St. John's veterans.



Kristian Finfrock Army (1995-2000)

What did your faith in God look like during active duty? It was there but not developed. I never had church in my life so my faith was believing and praying, but not much more. My grandmother would take us to church and Awanas, but I was never a "member" of a church.

How did you connect with God when serving? I did attend chaplainled services occasionally, especially while in training and deployed. Did you feel like you had a "church"? No. I feel like I had a group of like-minded individuals that would occasionally attend service, but not a "church," per se.

Did you connect with the chaplain? No, other than attending service and praying before missions.

And if faith was not a part of that season, then how has your faith changed your life now? Faith became a major part of my life with the birth of my daughters. I wanted them to be baptized and connected to a faith family. I was blessed with knowing Jeff and Deb Herbers and then St. John's through them. It has completely changed my life for the better. What would you say to your younger self? Get involved in a faith group. Be a leader. Put all of your trust in God. Be better than you think you are able and capable of!

Steve Halverson, Army (1984-1992)

I am an Army Veteran. My service started in November 1984, five months after high school graduation. I went to basic training at Fort Dix, NJ and Power Generation School in Fort Belvoir, VA. After graduating Advanced Individual Training, I was stationed at Friedburg, Germany in the 3rd Armored Division for 2 years. While there, I deployed to many field training exercises and small and large arms/weapon missions. I was then stationed at Fort Hood, TX and joined the 2nd Armored Division. I did a



tour in the Mojave Desert, CA. I quickly figured out why they call it Death Valley: extreme heat & terrain.

In 1988 I moved back to Stoughton, signed up for college, and joined a National Guard unit. In November 1990, our unit was activated to go to Desert Storm. We were deployed over to Saudi Arabia, Iraq, and Kuwait City. After the war, I came back home to my soon-to-be wife, Ann, and was fully out of the military by 1992. I did look forward to letters and packages from Ann, family, and friends while overseas. Letters were really the only way of frequent communication even if it was delayed. We had only a handful of opportunities to call home during Desert Storm. In fact, it cost so much money for an overseas phone call that I was only able to talk to my family once in two years on the phone.

When I was in the Army I wasn't connected to a church; we were always on the move. During my service, there were at least a dozen times I feared for my life. I prayed to God that I'd make it out alive and safely back home. While in Desert Storm I did go to the prayer services with our chaplain. It was a place to decompress and talk about how we were doing and what we needed. It made me feel better about our situation and supported by the chaplain and God.

I'd say my faith is better now and after being deployed to some of the worst places in the world, where basically life means little to nothing. It has made me appreciate my family and friends and what freedom really means. We were very fortunate that we lost no one over in Desert Storm from my unit; the sad reality is after 30 years, one-third of our unit has passed away and another one-third is sick because of the effects of war. St. John's has been there for myself and my family in times of need and has meant a lot to me throughout the years. Being raised Catholic in my younger years, St. John's has been a breath of fresh air to me.

Gregg Peckham Army (1985-1993, 2001-2018)

What did your faith in God look like during active duty?

Faith was good.

How did you connect with God when serving? Before a mission I would give a prayer.

Did you feel like you had a "church"?

Didn't need a building to have faith or God.

Did you connect with the chaplain?



I remember when it was over 100 degrees in the field, Chaplain would bring us ICEE pops to cool us down, talk, and give us a prayer.

Did you stay connected to a congregation back home?

The Lutheran church was there for us. I didn't have to worry about my family.

And if faith was not a part of that season, then how has your faith changed your life now?

I thank God every day for getting me home to my family.

What would you say to your younger self?

I would tell my younger self to always have faith and to live life to the fullest.





Greg Waidley Navy (1987-1995)

I served in the US Navy from 1987 to 1995. For six of those eight years, I was stationed aboard the USS Nimitz (aircraft carrier) as a nuclear-qualified electrical operator.

I have to admit that I didn't attend church much

during my time in the Navy, and I certainly wasn't a member of a church. However, my grandfather was a Methodist minister, and I always had faith in God. In fact, I served with a diverse group of sailors, and on occasion, we had conversations about each other's backgrounds and religious upbringings.

When I got out of the Navy, I enrolled in college back in Tennessee. During that time, I lived close to my grandparents, and we had many insightful conversations about God and faith. After college and graduate school, I moved around a lot (again!), and it wasn't until I finally settled in Evansville in 2004 to start a family that I began looking for a church.

Looking back, I suppose the best thing that I did was to engage those who I knew had a strong faith and for whom I had a healthy respect. I listened to them, thought about what they said, and I guess my faith grew just enough over the years to the point that I was ready to be receptive to God when He called me to St. John's.



Jeremy Steindl Marine Corps (1996-2005)

I served in the United States Marine Corps from April 1996 to February 2005. The Marine Corps' motto of "God.Country.Corps." is instilled during bootcamp and is a reflection of our devotion to our

faith, country, and service. Sunday mornings were a time to "get away" from the every-minute stresses of bootcamp. It was highly recommended to go to church, even if it was at least to have a change of pace. I, of course, went, and it was very relieving to be in a peaceful place. Nobody could do wrong in the chapel, and everyone was welcome. I never lost my faith in God, but God and church just didn't seem to be a top priority after bootcamp. I was not part of a congregation prior to my service, which I believe is partially the reason why I did not prioritize my faith. Bethany and I married while I was active duty in North Carolina. Being in a new place, we did not really attend church, as we relied heavily on our military friends. I was deployed with the 26th Marine Expeditionary Unit in October 2001, shortly after the terrorist attack on Sept 11th. In November 2001, I was in Afghanistan as a part of Operation Enduring Freedom. There is an old saying that if you don't believe in God, you will when your life is on the line. When in Afghanistan was about the time when prayers were said more often over the next four months than any other time in my life. We did not have a chaplain while incountry, and we were on our own. We did have some discussions about God and our faiths among ourselves. Everyone comes from a different religious background, which led to many different views, but we all had faith in God.

Shortly after returning from deployment, Bethany, our two-year-old son Marcus, and I moved to San Angelo, Texas. Bethany really wanted to find a church and start attending worship again. We found a small

Baptist church while we lived in Texas. We really loved that church. We made many friends within the congregation; I coached the church youth baseball team. It was perfect. Then our second son Tristan was born with many complications. To be closer to family, I left the Marine Corps, and we moved again, back to Evansville, Wisconsin. Bethany began attending St. John's again, and I soon followed her.



I have had some pretty rough times in my life. Times that many people do not know about; none which are related to my military service. Trusting my faith and talking to God has helped me overcome these tough times. My faith has also rewarded me with much joy and happiness.

I don't know if I would give myself any advice. I have always had faith in God, but how I practiced my faith (or didn't) seemed to be a part of God's plan for me. I have always found God, whether in a Methodist, Baptist, or Lutheran Church, or in a foreign country. I am thankful God has always been a part of my life in one way or another.

Nick Bitz Army (1998-2005)

What did your faith in God look like during active duty?

There was a lot of exploring different religions including Christianity.

How did you connect with God when serving? Through prayer

Did you feel like you had a "church"?

No, I never made the effort to find a church. But I did explore different churches when I was in basic training. It was a way to get away from the drill sergeant.

Did you connect with the chaplain?

No, our chaplain was not very outgoing. The chaplain's assistant was a little weird. But there was this Mormon that was the kindest person. Not that I would go to the temple, but you could look up to this guy as a good role model.

Did you stay connected to a congregation back home?

No, but I would attend when I went back home on leave with my family. It was always strange because they knew I served, and they were always thanking me for my service.

And if faith was not a part of that season, then how has your faith changed your life now?

Kristin, my wife, had a big part in my faith story. If I wouldn't have met her when I did, I wouldn't be the Christian I am now.

What would you say to your younger self?

Nothing. This is what God intended.


Faithful Service Highlight: Projection and Sound Technicians

As technical as that sounds, there is a solid group of people who make "the machine" work every Saturday and Sunday worship services. It takes two people — one to run the sound and video and one to run the PowerPoint. The group is mighty who serve in this way, but the mighty are few.



Just imagine how "unwelcoming" worship would be if we did not have these servant-hearted technicians? Those with hearing impairments would miss hearing the Good News of Jesus. Those who are homebound would never hear or see worship with St. John's, their Church family. The service would lack images and photos that accent the preaching and teaching for those visual learners. The music leaders would need to sing really loudly to be heard. And most of us would be looking down into our bulletins to follow along, missing the faces and Spirit moving among the congregation.



Thank the technicians the next time you are in the Sanctuary or watch on YouTube. These jobs are teachable. The service is honorable. Maybe God is calling you or one of your middle/high school youth to join the Holy Spirit magic in the back.

Our Evansville Ecumenical Care Closet provides Thanksgiving baskets each year to 75+ client-friends. St. John's is supplying ingredients "4" the dessert again this year. Our goal is 75 of the following 4 ingredients: 15 oz can pumpkin puree, 12 oz evaporated milk, pumpkin pie spice (2oz), and yellow cake mix. <u>Bring any or all of these 4 ingredients to the church building by</u> <u>Monday, November 13.</u> In case you're curious, here's the recipe to go with the ingredients:

Great Pumpkin Dessert

(15 ounce) can pumpkin
 (12 fluid ounce) can evaporated milk
 3 eggs
 1 cup white sugar
 4 teaspoons pumpkin pie spice
 (18.25 ounce) package yellow cake mix
 34 cup butter, melted
 ½ cups chopped walnuts



Preheat oven to 350°. Grease a 9x13 inch baking pan. Combine pumpkin, milk, eggs, sugar and spice. Mix well, and pour into pan. Sprinkle dry cake mix over the top, then drizzle with melted butter. Top with walnuts. Bake 1 hour or until a knife inserted near the center comes out clean.


